Was the flip flop due to Roe v Wade, or lack of Republican action on gun control? Who knows, but even with these changing preferences will it be enough to keep Democrats in control. The pundits don't think so. Apparently, with all the gerrymandering that has gone on this year these gurus still believe the Republicans will prevail. Prior to announcing her possible visit, Ms
Pelosi should have consulted with the White
House and the Pentagon, both of which opined,
after her public announcement, that they
wished she would not make the visit. As Alan
Dupont, a former Australian defense analyst
said, "It doesn't say much about Biden's clout
that he can't prevail on the speaker from his
own party."

Of course, once the public announcement was made, we had no choice but to follow through. To back down because China said we had better cancel the visit would make the U.S. look feeble, kowtowing to China's dictates. As a result it was no surprise that both Democrats and Republicans spoke out in favor of the trip, essentially saying, "China doesn't tell us what we can or can't do." Given the heated environment, Ms. Pelosi should have just kept her mouth shut.

What fruits did her visit reap? Just the biggest live practice invasion of Taiwan by the Chinese ever staged. Folks, this was not just firing a few missiles off the Taiwan coast. Turns out there was a non-congressional member in Ms. Pelosi's trip to Taiwan, her son, Paul Pelosi Jr. He sits on the board of two lithium mining exploration companies whose stock prices have jumped 65% and 35% in recent days. China is home to some of the world's top lithium-ion battery producers, including Tesla's own chief supplier, CATL. Paul Jr. has every reason to make nice with China.

Anyway, as the writer Alex Koyfman observes, in the immediate aftermath of Ms. Pelosi's trip (she has been a constant critic of China's human rights record for a long time) she had two things to say. "We still support the One China policy." And, "China is one of the freest societies in the world." You can't make this stuff up.
