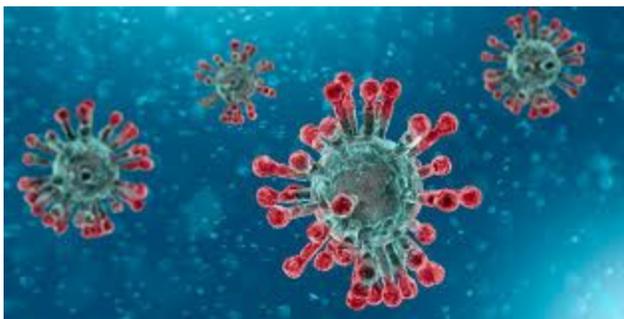
History, Then and Now
